How to find us


TRAVEL BY TRAIN

Bochum Central Station is served by ICE, IC, EC, regional, and suburban trains at a high frequency. From there, you can reach us easily by taking the underground line U35 (CampusLinie) straight to the Ruhr-Universität Bochum (RUB), which has its own station named after it. The U35 (direction Bochum Hustadt) runs at fiveminute intervals on weekdays and takes just ten minutes to get to the university. Motorists can also easily reach the RUB via the dense network of motorways in Germany and especially in North Rhine-Westphalia.
